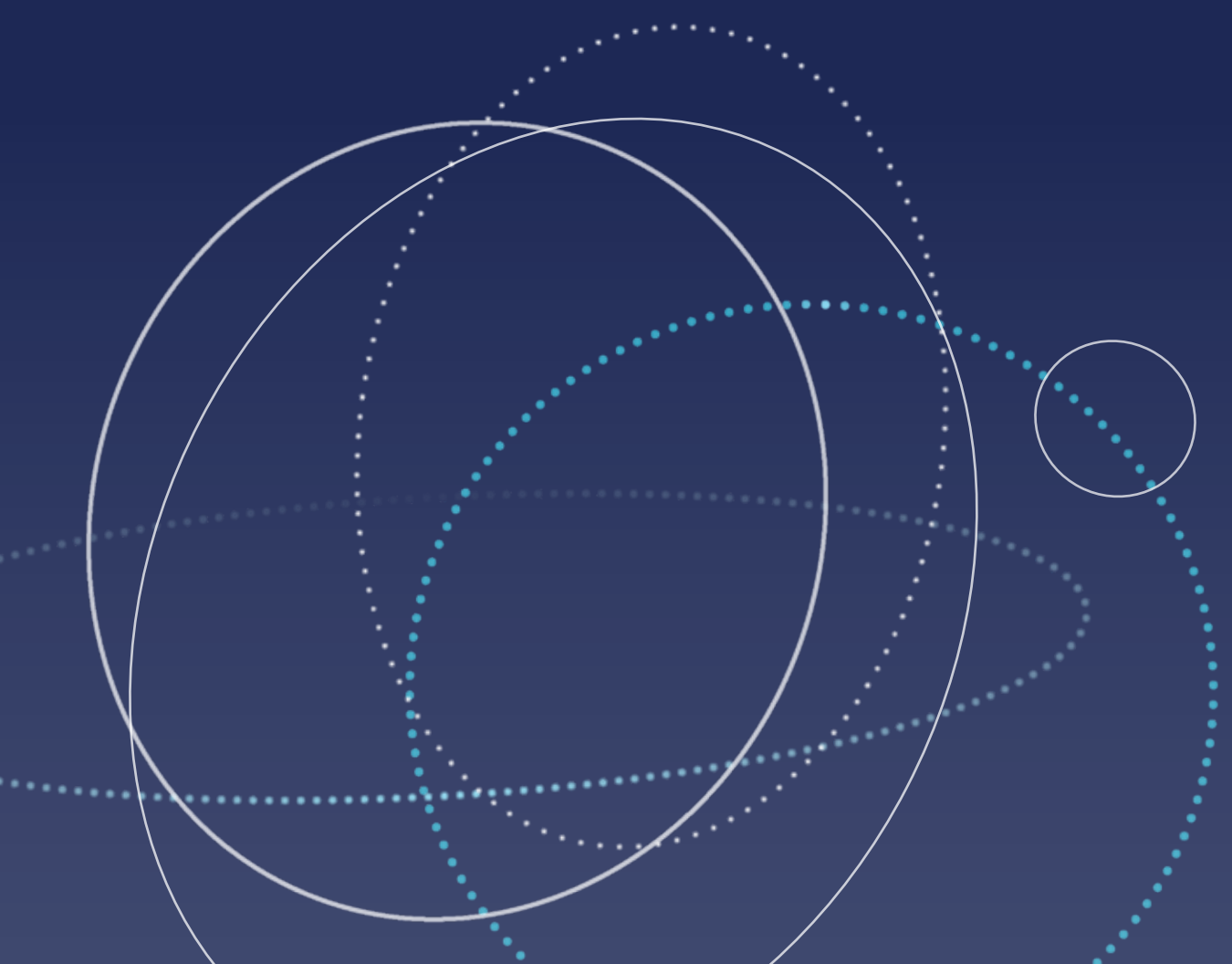

WHAT

The **International Ph.D. Programme in Criminology** aims to be the preferred Programme for highly qualified students pursuing an **advanced research degree in criminology**. The Programme views interdisciplinary work and research as the core of its activity. It aims to promote innovative and dynamic thinking by blending theory and practice in the fields of criminology, criminal justice, and crime prevention.

HOW

The Ph.D. **prepares graduates** to meet traditional and **emerging standards of excellence in criminology**. This is achieved through a training, research, and teaching Programme. Graduates of the Programme will be well-prepared to pursue diverse career paths, including **academia, research, law enforcement, international organisations, industry, and consulting**.

TRANSCRIME

The coordination of the Programme is supported by **Transcrime, the Joint Research Centre on Innovation and Crime** of the Università Cattolica del Sacro Cuore of Milan (www.transcrime.it/en). Today, Transcrime has become a **leading international institution** for scholars exploring crime from a range of perspectives, including criminology, sociology, law, and economics. Its **excellence in research** is proved by the substantial international funding in this area (projects under the 6th and the 7th Framework Programmes, Horizon 2020, Horizon Europe, and DG Home Affairs).

STRENGTHS OF THE PH.D.

WORK IN A THRIVING RESEARCH CENTRE

Candidates will collaborate in the management and organisation of the Transcrime's projects and research activities, **along with a staff of more than 30 members**. Over the last decades, Transcrime has carried out **more than 300 research projects**, mostly as coordinator, funded by local, national and international authorities and institutions.

INTERNATIONAL EXPERIENCE

All the activities of the Ph.D. are in **English**. This includes lectures, seminars, the Ph.D. thesis and the final defence.

As part of our Programme, Ph.D. candidates will have the opportunity to broaden their academic experience by spending **a semester** of studies and research at a foreign university or research institution. Upon successful conclusion of the period abroad in one of the partner universities, Ph.D. candidates may be recognised with the **title of Doctor Europaeus**.

EDUCATION - TRAINING

MASTER COURSES

First year candidates will attend Master's courses aimed at completing and strengthening their background. The required coursework is **determined upon admission to the Programme** and tailored to each candidate's curriculum. Master's courses culminate in a final examination. Additionally, Ph.D. candidates will prepare a paper (in English) on a topic agreed upon with the Professor of the course(s).

Graduate courses may include:

- *Statistics and advanced statistics*
- *Criminal law and procedure (Italian and comparative)*
- *Methodology of criminological research*
- *Criminology and applied criminology*

RESEARCH AND METHODOLOGICAL TRAINING

Ph.D. candidates will attend specific training activities (first and second year candidates). Transcrime holds short and long seminars, which are also attended by Ph.D. candidates.

PH.D. COURSES

Ph.D. candidates will attend courses specifically organised for the Ph.D. Programme, aimed to provide in-depth knowledge of specific topics (first and second year candidates). They may also attend courses organised in collaboration with other universities.

DOCTORAL TRAINING

Università Cattolica del Sacro Cuore provides a number of training activities for Ph.D. candidates from all Programmes. They include training on methodology, bibliography, writing, presentation, public speaking and English for academic purposes.

LITERATURE REVIEW

In their first year, Ph.D. candidates will work under the guidance of senior researchers to complete a literature review (or reviews) on a specific topic related to the candidate's research interests.

EDUCATION - RESEARCH

PARTICIPATION IN RESEARCH PROJECTS

Ph.D. candidates will contribute to **Transcrime's ongoing research projects** on a day-to-day basis, gradually taking on increasing project responsibilities. By the third year of the Programme, candidates will be expected to coordinate a research project (under the supervision of Professor Savona and other senior researchers).

ARTICLE FOR A SCIENTIFIC JOURNAL

Ph.D. candidates will write **a paper on a topic related to their research interests** under the supervision of the coordinator and their tutor (second and third year candidates). By the end of the second year, candidates are expected to have at least one paper approved for publication in an international peer-reviewed journal.

PH.D. THESIS

Ph.D. candidates will write a doctoral thesis to complete the Programme. The thesis is expected to reach the standard of a publishable book, i.e. the standard used when acting as a referee for a refereed **journal article or a book proposed to an international publisher**.

TEACHING ACTIVITIES

TUTORING

Ph.D. candidates may **tutor students from the BSc and the MSc programmes** of the Faculty of Political and Social Sciences at the Università Cattolica del Sacro Cuore of Milan. This will include assisting course professors with class management, assignments, exams and marking.

Ph.D. candidates may also **tutor students in writing their final dissertations**. This includes coaching students and revising documents in collaboration with course professors.

WORKSHOPS AND SEMINARS

Ph.D. candidates may hold **workshops and seminars for students on the BSc and the MSc programmes** of the Faculty of Political and Social Sciences of the Università Cattolica del Sacro Cuore of Milan (second and third year candidates).

These activities cover research and writing skills, along with specific seminars on a topic related to the candidate's research interests.

STUDY COURSE

FIRST YEAR

RESEARCH PROJECT FORMULATION

By the end of the first year, Ph.D. candidates will deliver: **an activity report, the research project for their Ph.D. thesis, and the first draft chapter of the thesis.**

In particular, they will be required to select a research topic and conduct a detailed literature review, identify knowledge gaps and one or more research issues on which to focus.

Ph.D. candidates will be required to defend their research project and topic formulation before the Academic Board, for admission to the second year of the Programme.

SECOND YEAR

RESEARCH PROJECT AND SCIENTIFIC PAPER

Ph.D. candidates will further advance their research through reports, which will be discussed individually or in a seminar format every two months. By the end of the second year, Ph.D. candidates will have carried out: **an activity report, a research project, a draft of the first two chapters of the thesis, and a paper approved by an international peer-reviewed journal.** The paper should ideally address the topic of the candidate's thesis.

Ph.D. candidates will be required to defend their research project and paper before the Academic Board for admission to the third year of the Programme.

THIRD YEAR

COMPLETION OF THE PH.D. THESIS

Ph.D. candidates will carry out their research and complete their Ph.D. thesis. The candidate's progress will be evaluated through periodic meetings. By the end of their third year, **candidates must submit an activity report and a draft of their final thesis. The admission to the final examination will follow a procedure designed to ensure the high quality of the thesis and research.** The draft thesis will be evaluated by the candidate's advisor and two external referees with expertise in the thesis topic. The thesis must meet the standard of a publishable paper or book. Based on the evaluations of the advisor and external referees, the Academic Board will decide whether to recommend that the candidate submits the thesis to the Examination Commission for the final defence.

STUDY COURSE RESEARCH PROPOSAL

The purpose of the research proposal is to demonstrate your **knowledge of the field**, **identify research gaps**, and **propose suitable methods to address those gaps**. Preparing a doctoral research proposal for the International Ph.D. in Criminology requires careful consideration of various elements. Here are some suggestions to help you create a comprehensive and well-structured research proposal:

REVIEW THE STATE OF THE ART:

- Start by conducting a thorough **literature review** of the current scientific research in the field of criminology, specifically focusing on your area of interest.
- Identify key theories, concepts, and empirical studies that have contributed to the **understanding of the topic**.
- **Highlight** relevant **research gaps** or **unanswered questions** that you have identified during the literature review.

DEFINE THE RESEARCH PROBLEM AND QUESTIONS:

- Clearly **state the research problem** or issue you intend to address in your study.
- **Formulate research questions** that are specific, focused, and aligned with the research problem.
- Your **research questions** should be designed **to fill the identified research gaps** and contribute to the existing knowledge in the field.

SET OBJECTIVES AND METHODOLOGY:

- Outline the **objectives of your research**, explaining what you aim to achieve with your study.
- Describe the **methodology** you intend to use to address your research questions and achieve your objectives.
- Clearly specify the **research design**, **data collection methods**, and **analysis techniques** you plan to employ.
- Justify the appropriateness of your **chosen methods** in relation to the research problem and questions.

STUDY COURSE RESEARCH PROPOSAL

DISCUSS EXPECTED RESULTS AND POSSIBLE LIMITATIONS:

- Provide an **overview** of the expected outcomes of your research.
- Explain how your study will contribute to the field of criminology and address the identified research gaps.
- Acknowledge and discuss **potential limitations** or **challenges** that you may encounter during the research process.
- Demonstrate awareness of any constraints or ethical considerations relevant to your proposed research.

INCLUDE A REFERENCE LIST:

- Compile a comprehensive reference list of all the sources cited in your research proposal.
- Follow the appropriate referencing style such as APA, ASA, or Chicago.

GENERAL TIPS:

- Ensure that your research proposal is **well-organised, coherent**, and easy to follow.
- Use clear and **concise language** to convey your ideas.
- Seek **feedback** from your advisor or colleagues to improve the clarity and quality of your proposal.
- Pay attention to **formatting** and **presentation**, including headings, subheadings, and consistent citation style.

Tailor your proposal to align with the specific requirements and expectations of the International Ph.D. in Criminology Programme. You can get an idea of possible topics of interest from the publications and webpages of the members of the Academic Board, from previously completed Ph.D. dissertations available in the Docta Archive of the Università Cattolica and from the research projects conducted at Transcrime.

FINAL DEFENCE

MEMBERS OF PREVIOUS COMMISSIONS

STUDY COURSE

The final defence will be held before a commission composed of at least three professors from Italian and foreign universities, two of whom are not members of the Academic Board. The defence, public and entirely in English, will include the presentation of the candidate's research and results followed by questions of the commissioners. The commission will award the title of Ph.D. in Criminology to candidates authoring innovative and high-quality studies at an international level.

RESEARCH PERIOD ABROAD

Staying abroad is a crucial opportunity to enrich Ph.D. candidates' academic and scientific journey.

The period of research and study abroad is optional, except for different provisions due, for example, to the type of scholarship.

The period abroad lasts **from 3 to 6 months**, although shorter or longer periods may be considered for specific needs.

Candidates considering spending a period of study abroad should follow these **guidelines**.

DESTINATION SELECTION

The destination for the period abroad is identified by Ph.D. candidates in agreement with their supervisor and the course coordinator. Subsequently, **the destination is approved by the entire Academic Board**.

The choice of destination should be based on the research topic of the doctoral thesis. Candidates, therefore, select a hosting institution where professors or researchers conduct **research related to the doctoral student's area of interest**.

Candidates are encouraged to consider periods abroad during the **second and third years of the Ph.D.**, or in any case after the doctoral research is sufficiently defined.

RESEARCH AND TRAINING ACTIVITIES

Research and training activities should be agreed upon with the professor or supervisor of the receiving institution and may include, for example, participation in research projects, seminars, conferences, lectures, presentations of the doctoral thesis to students and colleagues, work on publications, and development of the doctoral thesis.

Other training activities, not strictly related to academic purposes, provide an opportunity to establish relationships and **networks** with professors, doctoral students, and researchers from the hosting institution.

RESEARCH PERIOD ABROAD

REQUEST AND APPROVAL

The request for a stay abroad is formulated in advance in agreement with the supervisor and the coordinator of the doctoral Programme. The request must be formalized by sending an email to the supervisor and the coordinator, containing a proposal for one or two possible destinations. This will allow the request to be included in the agenda of the Academic Board meeting.

The approval of the Academic Board is required to proceed with the planning of the stay and the formalisation of bureaucratic issues.

TIMING AND BUREAUCRATIC ASPECTS

Planning ahead is important, especially for destinations that require visas or involve complex bureaucratic procedures.

Ph.D. candidates are responsible for ensuring that all necessary information and documents for the stay abroad are provided in accordance with the local laws and regulations of the hosting institution.

INFORMAL PRE-APPLICATION

ADMISSION

It is possible to participate in an **informal pre-application procedure at any moment of the year** by sending an email to the Coordinator of the Ph.D. (Prof. Francesco Calderoni, francesco.calderoni@unicatt.it) and attaching an English CV. Afterwards, the candidate **may be invited to submit a research proposal in English** and to participate in a **phone or Microsoft Teams interview** to discuss the proposal.

The candidate will receive an evaluation from the Coordinator with **two possible results**:

- a) **positive assessment**, exempting the candidate from submitting a research proposal and participating in the interview after the publication of the call for applications. The candidate will formalise his/her application, after the publication of the call, by sending the documentation requested at the following link: <https://dottorati.unicatt.it/candidarsi/i-bandi.html>
- b) **negative assessment**, allowing to submit a formal application after having substantially revised the research proposal during the formal application period.

The informal pre-application procedure is available throughout the year, except during the period immediately before the publication of the official call for applications and until the deadline for applications expires.

Undergraduate students who are due to graduate by 31 October 2026 are eligible to apply. The **official call for applications of the XLII Cycle** (in English and Italian) has been published on the Ph.D. office webpage. It contains detailed instructions to submit the application via the dedicated form.

The deadline for applications is 23 June 2026. The selection is usually completed by the end of September.

Each candidate must submit a **research proposal in English** for their Ph.D. thesis. The proposal should be divided into the following sections:

- review of the state-of-the-art
- research problem and questions
- objectives and methodology
- expected results and possible limitations
- reference list

The research proposal must not exceed 20,000 characters (bibliography included).

THE EVALUATION

ADMISSION

The **evaluation for admission to the Ph.D.** is based on the following criteria (also for candidates with a positive assessment in the pre-application procedure):

- a) **curriculum vitae and other titles**
- b) **research proposal**
- c) **phone or video (e.g. via Microsoft Teams) interview**

The assessment is based on a 0 to **70-point scale** according to the following criteria:

- Points **a)** and **b)** can be scored between **0 and 20 points each**. Only candidates with a total score of at least 30 points will be admitted to the interview.

The results of the assessment of points a) and b) will be communicated to the candidate by email (or [here](#)) along with the possible interview invitation within 20 days from the expiry of the call for applications.

- Point **c)** can be scored between **0 and 30 points**. The interview will be conducted in English and will aim at discussing the candidate's motivation and research proposal, as well as answering any questions the candidate may have. Only candidates receiving **at least 20 points** may be admitted to the Ph.D.

The final ranking is determined by the sum of the scores achieved in points a), b), and c). Candidates will be admitted according to the ranking, up to the number of available positions.

SCHOLARSHIPS

According to the Italian Ministry of Education, the base-level scholarship amount is €16,243.00 gross per year. Ph.D. scholarships are tax-exempt but require the payment of social security contributions.

In recognition of the candidate's cooperation with Transcrime's activities, **First-year candidates** may receive an additional annual scholarship of up to about **€5,450 gross**. **Second and third-year candidates** may receive an additional yearly scholarship of about **€7,700 gross**. The additional scholarship will be awarded for each month of collaboration with Transcrime. This additional fee will be recalculated if the base-level scholarship, established in accordance with the law, is updated.

The base-level scholarship is increased by 50% for stays abroad. As of the first year, candidates will have a research expenses budget amounting to 10% of the gross annual base-level scholarship.

To promote the **international scope of the Ph.D.**, the admitted candidates with a Master's Degree from a foreign university and residing abroad may be reimbursed up to € 5,000 for documented travel and lodging expenses incurred during the first year of the Ph.D. due to their moving to Milan.

ADMISSION FEES

Every year, the Università Cattolica del Sacro Cuore sets the annual amount of the tuition **fees**.

For the XLII Cycle of the International Ph.D. in Criminology, Ph.D. candidates will be required to pay a tuition fee amounting to about € 836 per year, to be paid in two instalments.
